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Local Planning Strategy

Upgrade of sports lighting luminaires at Ashfield Reserve

Works will soon be underway at Ashfield Reserve with the tender for the upgrade of the sports lighting luminaires on the Main Pitch and Training Pitch awarded.

The project will result in the luminaires being updated to current technology and more effective and efficient LED lights, with headframes to suit, both of which will be designed and verified for the existing poles.

Ashfield Reserve is the home of Ashfield Soccer Club and Perth Strikers. The new luminaires will increase the lighting intensity and uniformity of lighting on the sports field, allowing training to occur at night, and improving security and player safety. There will be no change to the electrical installation currently supplying the existing luminaires.

Works are due to commence in May with the project expected to be completed by mid-September 2023.





National Tree Day is Australia's largest tree planting and nature care event, and includes Schools Tree Day on Friday 28 July and National Tree Day on Sunday 30 July.

Trees significantly enhance our quality of life in the urban environment. Not only do trees provide habitat for animals, birds and insects, moderate the climate, improve air quality and reduce stormwater runoff, they also offer social, environmental and economic benefits throughout their lifetime.

A key direction of the Town of Bassendean's Strategic Community Plan is to support the creation of a more green and shaded Town and the 2023 winter planting programs are currently underway. Through a combination of Town works and volunteer input, around 21,000 plants will be established in natural areas and up to 1,000 advanced trees planted in streets and reserves.

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Point Reserve Foreshore Concept Plan

A foreshore concept plan has been developed to guide future works and environmental restoration at Point Reserve.

Development of the Point Reserve Foreshore Plan involved a river value desktop assessment, workshops with Bassendean Primary River Rangers and Councillors, and community and stakeholder consultation on a range of options.

In February 2023, Council resolved to approve the Foreshore Plan with inclusion of specific elements in the final concept. The next stage will involve detailed design development.

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Ashfield Flats boardwalk upgrade

The Town, in partnership with the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage and the Western Australian Planning Commission, are undertaking a project to upgrade the decking on the Ashfield Flats boardwalk.

The works commenced on 8 May and are anticipated to take approximately four weeks to complete. The 107 metres of existing boards and kick rail are being replaced with new 200 mm x 40 mm x 3 metre jarrah boards, equating to approximately 550 boards in total.

The Ashfield Flats boardwalk is a longstanding attraction in Bassendean, originally built in the 1980s by the Bassendean Preservation Group. The boardwalk further underwent an extension in 1996 with help from a group called Skillshare using grant funding received by the Bassendean Preservation Group. Since then it has been very well used by the local community and visitors to the Town who enjoy the views of native vegetation, river and wildlife. Hail to rail

at the Railway Museum

The Railway Museum in Bassendean is operated by Rail Heritage WA and offers a fully immersive experience of the history of trains in Western Australia.

Did you know?

Prior to the opening of the transcontinental railway in 1917, the only way for West Australians to travel to Melbourne or Sydney was via steamship from Fremantle, Albany or Esperance. The promise of a railway connecting WA to the Eastern States meant WA agreed to join the Federation and for many years it remained a symbol of national unity.

It is the principal museum devoted to railway history in Western Australia and boasts a collection spanning the whole spectrum of railway history—from first-class passenger carriages for VIPs to humble workhorse locomotives, to powerful diesel trains, and freight wagons used to transport gold.

Railways central to the development of Western Australia

Prior to the 1950s, rail was integral in Western Australia as a means of transporting people and natural resources, such as timber and gold, across the state.

In 1881 the first passenger rail line opened in the Perth Metropolitan area from Fremantle to Midland. In the first three months of operation 21,270 passengers travelled via locomotive across the growing city for work and leisure. People could now reach further distances than ever before.

Between 1889 and 1897 the population in the State grew from 45,660 to 160,495. This led to an increase in rail travel by 2147%*

Rail carriages and locomotives were mostly imported from England before the Railway Workshops were built at Midland. Some of these sleeper carriages boasted the height of luxury with full bedrooms (though with shared bathroom quarters). Long distance trains also had dining cars and a lounge for passengers in which to enjoy their journey. Wood carvings, stained glass and brass fixtures adorned the interiors.

Hundreds of workers were employed at Midland Railways and the Western Australian Government railways (both with workshops in Midland) to maintain these carriages and locomotives.

The railway in Western Australian was inherent to the colonisation and development of our State. These networks connected the vast state and its commercial and industry interests, causing rapid growth and population increase.

Rail networks employed thousands of workers as locomotive staff, guards, catering staff, ticketing staff, station staff and signalmen. Many of the workshops' personnel travelled to work on the Fremantle to Midland line.

From the 1950s onwards, car ownership increased from 104,735 registered vehicles to 745,000 registered vehicles in the 1980s. The resulting dismantling of many rail networks took place over the course of the second part of the last century.

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At the heart of Bassendean ____

Jill Ruse has been a graphic designer and illustrator for over 40 years and a resident of Bassendean for many years.

She was employed at the Town of Bassendean Library for 22 years and produced most of the Library's promotional material during that time.

In 2019, Jill held a successful exhibition at the then O2 Cafe in Old Perth Road, Bassendean.

Jill has freelanced for private clients and organisations such as Museum WA, Western Mining and FINA Swimming Championships. She also previously worked at Curtin University (then WAIT) and the Research School of Biological Science and Media Centre (Canberra).



How long have you lived in Bassendean?

I've lived in Bassendean for 34 years. The Town has evolved from a sleepy backwater to more of an urban area but still retaining a country ambience.

How long did you work at TOB?

After freelancing for about 10 years I was employed as a library officer at the Town of Bassendean. That was in 1997, and the best job ever! Great boss, great people, and a wonderful community spirit. I retired in 2019 after 22 years of being involved in many of the Library and the Town's events. Lots of Children's Book Weeks!

What type of artwork have you specialised in?

Most of my artwork are illustrations for private clients, businesses and Government agencies such as the Australian National University in Canberra, Western Mining and Museum WA. There was some design and layout of brochures and books, but mostly illustrations of buildings and natural history subjects. Museum books include *Gogo Fish*, *Leo the Marsupial Lion* and tropical fish guides. In 2019, a friend and I held an exhibition of our art at the O2 Cafe in Old Perth Road.



What is your favourite medium and why?

After years of producing black and white illustrations for reproduction, the thrill of using watercolours was like waking up after a long sleep. I use watercolours almost solidly with a fine brush.

What inspires your work – nature, other art, music etc?

I could say money(!), but many years ago I realised that spending many more hours than necessary to aim for perfection wasn't the best business model. These days I look at lots of designs on the internet and that's inspiring.

What is your secret to staying motivated in the arts?

What keeps me motivated? It's innate. I have to be making something (or thinking about a new project). I love the process of a tangle of thoughts at the beginning, and the 'journey' to the 'ah' at the end.

What helps a community to flourish in the arts?

I think it depends on where you live. If you live in a community where arts are treated as an important reflection of the current and past culture of that community then the arts will thrive.

What types of arts events and projects would you like to see staged in the Town?

Arts and events have flourished and waned over the time I've lived in Bassendean. Some years there were many events, including outdoor movies, family friendly evening concerts and arts awards. At the Library we held regular art exhibitions and literary salons. The exhibition space—the Library walls and floor space were offered to any Bassendean resident, young or old, who wanted to show their art. As a non-profit organisation, there was no cost or commission involved and the artist was responsible for their work and any sales. The Library would promote the event with posters and in the Library newsletter. I would have liked the Town to support an exhibition space in the shopping precinct for local artists. Record fairs and more bands playing in the area is another dream ...
